Pictured above is Presque Isle, a beautiful home completed in 1813. On July 25th, it was the location of a celebration commemorating the tenth anniversary of the Museum of Culpeper History. Our BSF President Bud Hall was the featured guest speaker. Bud discussed the history of the property , especially during the Civil War. The property is

strategically located between Welford's Ford on the Hazel River and Freeman's Ford on the Rappahannock River. Union General Emory Upton occupied the home during the winter encampment of 1863-1864. The Brandy Station Foundation is proud to be working alongside other preservation and history groups like the Museum of Culpeper History.

BATTLE OF RAPPAHANNOCK STATION FIELD TOUR RESCHEDULED

The Battle of Rappahannock Station field tour, originally scheduled for July 25th, has been rescheduled for November 7, 2010 at 2pm. November 7 -- is the 147th anniversary of the battle. The Brandy Station Foundation apologizes for being forced to postpone the July event, but the decision was made based on the extreme heat that was predicted for that afternoon. We look forward to seeing you in November and walking the fields on the same day when so much history happened.

This tour is a new twist on the Sunday lecture series: a lecture along with a “field trip.” Mike Block will present a lecture titled: Disaster on the Rappahannock: The Battle of Rappahannock Station, November 7, 1863. The approximately two hour tour begins with a brief campaign overview at the Graffiti House, 19484 Brandy Road, Brandy Station. A car caravan to the Rappahannock Station Battlefield in Remington follows; the tour group will walk about a mile to Confederate positions and the Federal points of attack. Key sites not on the battlefield will be identified. A waiver (provided at the site) is required to access the battlefield. Free, donations to the BSF are welcomed. The tour will go on rain or shine, although it will be rescheduled if severe weather is in the area. More information at www.brandystationfoundation.com

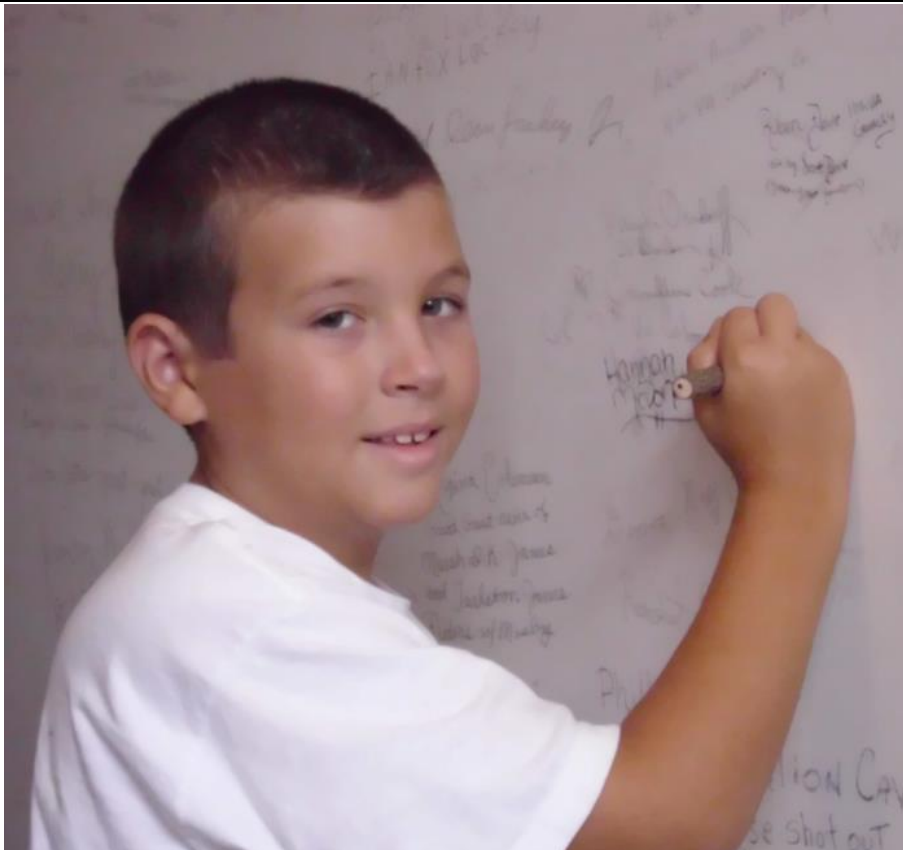
provost marshal's office as well as a shelter from the elements. Come share in this special evening at this place with a unique history.

MORE NAMES HAVE BEEN ADDED TO THE WALL OF HEROES AT THE GRAFFITI HOUSE

Brandon Renick is the great, great, great grandson of Calvin Brown Renick Calvin. Renick was born on May 20, 1836, at Renick's Valley P.O., outside of Lewisburg. He served with the Greenbrier Militia. When the Civil War began in 1861, Calvin Renick's Company, under

the command of Capt. Bob Moorman, volunteered for the Confederate Army as the Greenbrier Cavalry. The Cavalry rode north to cut the B. & O. Railroad from Ohio to Washington. They camped at Laurel Hill in northwest Virginia (now West Virginia) for several weeks. On June 1, 1861, Capt. Moorman sent Calvin and five men to stand picket at Fairfax, about six miles from Phillipi. Four Yankees approached and Calvin killed the soldier he fired upon. This was the first soldier killed in the Civil War in field fighting between troops. Calvin carried for many years affidavits, signed by two of the men with him, verifying this fact.



John Hall could be considered a double-dipper; he has two ancestors that can claim Civil War links to the Brandy Station area.

Elijah Hall served in Company E the 12th Virginia Cavalry and hailed from Fauquier County. The 12th was originally part of Turner Ashby's 7th Virginia Cavalry. Ten companies of the 7th were split off following Ashby's death in June 1862 to form the 12th Virginia Cavalry. Hall enlisted after the 12th was formed, in October 1862 and served with the unit throughout the war. He was paroled at Winchester in April 1865 and would live another 60 years.

Pictured above is John Hall with his wife (left), as well as BSF volunteer Caryn Block (watching from further on down the hall). John's second ancestor, Joseph Thomas would eventually rise to the rank of 1st Sergeant and served in Company H, 1st Virginia Cavalry, the Loudoun Light Horse. Joseph fought in both of the significant Cavalry fights in Culpeper, The Battle of Kelly's Ford on March 17, 1863 and he was on the field at Brandy Station on June 9, 1863. Joseph was wounded at the First Battle of Manassas in July 1861 where his horse was also killed. After he filed a claim for his horse, it took another 21 months for his claim to be approved! Thomas would die in 1882 at the age of 46.

Pictured below is Todd S. Lewis, whose ancestor, Private William Rufus Lewis--born on the 4th of July, 1844--was a trooper in Company D, 1st North Carolina Cavalry – the Watauga Rangers. The 1st North Carolina, under Brigadier General Wade Hampton, brought nearly 700 men into the June 9, 1863 fight, William being one of them. Originally assigned to extend the Confederate right flank in the vicinity of the St. James Church, the 1st NC, along with most of Hampton's command, crashed into the flanks of Brigadier General Judson Kilpatrick's regiments as they assaulted Fleetwood Hill. In the bitterly fought contest, the 1st North Carolina would suffer 31 casualties and capture the standard of the 10th New York Cavalry. Private Lewis would survive the war, after being captured in Boone, North Carolina and being held at the prisoner of war camp in Camp Chase, Ohio. Lewis died in Johnson City, Tennessee in June 1890 at the age of 46.
